Finding those Surnames:

Some terms defined courtesy of Rootsweb.com

- --SOUNDEX. This produces a four-character code beginning with the first letter of a surname followed by three numbers assigned according to the Soundex Coding Guide. Soundex keeps together names with the same and similar sounds, regardless of spelling. For a detailed explanation of Soundex, see RootsWeb's Guide To Tracing Family Trees: http://rwguide.rootsweb.com/lesson9.htm
- --METAPHONE. This is an algorithm to code English words phonetically by reducing them to 16 consonant sounds. It is similar in concept and purpose to Soundex, but more comprehensive in its approach.
- --FUZZY SEARCHES. These are available also. "Fuzzy" in geek-speak means" not exact" A fuzzy search will find variant spellings by applying the rules of Soundex (usually reserved for surname searches) to all WorldConnect fields -- excluding birth and death years.
- ◆ --SPECIAL SEARCHES. If you are searching for a Native American name, slave name, royal or nobility names, or other instances where only a given (first) name is used, you can do such a search in WorldConnect. Likely you will want to narrow down any "given name only" searches by including additional known information in your search terms.
- --SPECIFIC DATABASES. You can limit your advanced search to a specific database by starting within it and clicking on the ADVANCED SEARCH link. (This is important because it gives you access to much more data. You can often find information on a single database search that will be overlooked on the general SEARCH boxes. Try it, you will like it....Janice)

eBAY and More from Jennifer Pina

I was inspired the other day to play around with search terms related to my ancestry on eBay. By entering a variety of search terms, such as surnames, locations, and such, you find that a number of items of interest are available.

One such are old post cards. I bought a couple showing churches from congregations and locations connected to my ancestors. These can be had for under \$10.00 and sometimes much less. I also found a children's book from 1892, whose author has the same unusual surname as my mother's maiden name. I will add it to her mother's day package. This cost \$12.00.

Then, I REALLY got into trouble, when I discovered an online store called Ancestry World, which I reached using eBay as a portal. They sell hundreds of county histories, which have been digitized and loaded onto CDs. They are Adobe Acrobat readable, and most are described as SEARCH-ABLE! So, those massive books that have hundreds of pages can now be studied much more thoroughly. There are also a number of smaller history books, and books of vital records available. Sometimes a number of books are bundled onto one CD, so you get a lot of information for a certain location, which can be stored in very little space.

The coverage for the country at this point is spotty: Missouri only has two titles. Virginia had 57, I believe. However, if your location is represented, this is a wonderful find. Prices appear to range from about \$12.00 up to about \$25.00 for a large bundle of several titles.

National Archives and Footnote Launch Project to Digitize Historic Documents Online

Footnote, Inc. And the U.S. National Archives and Records Administration have announced a new partnership that will place millions of historical documents online. These documents have not been available online previously and many of them have never been microfilmed. Most of these documents were previously available only by traveling to the National Archives and examining the documents in person.

The new announcement describes a service that will make high-quality images available on any computer with an Internet connection. The potential here is huge for genealogists, historians, reenactors, students, teachers, railroad history buffs, and many more people.

"This is an exciting step forward for the National Archives," said Professor Weinstein. "It will immediately allow much greater access to approximately 4.5 million pages of important documents that are currently available only in their original format or on microfilm. The digitization of documents will also enhance our efforts to preserve our original records."
