### Immigration Research Ideas

Remember that the U.S. Federal Census for years 1900, 1910, 1920, 1930 ask each foreign-born person's year of immigration to the United States. Newspaper obituaries might also mention the immigrant's year of arrival.

Canadian Border Immigration records of persons crossing the U.S.-Canadian border were created and collected by the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) and its predecessors, the Bureau of Immigration and Naturalization (1906-33) and the Superintendent of Immigration (1891-1906). NARA has many films of the border crossings. An article in the NGS Newsmagazine for July-Sept, 2007 issue includes a helpful article by Claire Prechtel-Kluskens on these records and where to find them at the National Archives. The article includes descriptions of the various films. Finding a record of a relative's Canadian border crossing is becoming easier as more records become available. ## How to Use DNA for Family History.

was the topic of the fascinating and amusing presentation by Colleen Fitzgerald, PhD, at the Sep-



tember meeting of the society. Stating that the subject of DNA is not a difficult one she illustrated her speech with a series of interpretive slides. Fitzgerald clarified for her audience the differences between mitochondrial and nuclear DNA. The mother passes mitochondrial DNA to all of her children but only her daughters pass it on to the next generation. Nuclear DNA containing the male Y chromosome passes exclusively through the male line. It is this Y DNA that is used in genealogy studies, and therefore, only males are eligible as subjects.

Study of the number and types of mutations in DNA specimens gives

estimates of the date of common ancestors. These short repeats of mutations become markers which can be identified and presented in tables. Persons having identical or almost similar patterns are closely related. DNA testing, using swabs of cells from the mouth, is available from a number of companies, and the results can be sent to a number of data bases of world wide family studies.

Often the search cannot be complete without reference to the history of movements and migrations of the family groups and the geography of their origins. Fitzpatrick predicts increasing matches among different surnames until we are "one big happy family". She invited persons to contact via her web site at www.forensicgenealogy.info

Following the meeting Ms. Fitzgerald signed copies of her books, *Forensic Genealogy* and *DNA & Genealogy*.

The October meeting (to be held in the afternoon at our library) will have additional information about DNA when members Sandy Hoover, Ruth Jenkins and Janice Brown share their experiences in using DNA in genealogical research.

## A MOTHER FOUND

I found my mother this summer in the Barton County Historical Society, Great Bend, Kansas! I visited the society because I knew that my mother had lived in Great Bend for two years where she attended sixth and seventh grades from 1921 to 1923. A panorama picture displayed on the wall and labeled "Great Bend High School, 1920s" caught my eye. I thought they would at least be contemporaries of my mother and it would be fun to see the clothing and hair styles. Much to my surprise, there was my mother, staring at me from the middle of the picture. Closer inspection revealed that some of the students were holding up a banner which said Great Bend Junior High School. In my mother's memoirs she said that the seventh grade was in a junior high with different teachers for each subject. That dated the picture as the school year 1922-23.



We spent five weeks this summer traveling 8,000 miles in fourteen states and a major focus of the trip was visiting nine of the ten places my mother lived before she was fourteen and her parents moved to the west coast. McAllen Texas was too far away for this trip. Because they lived such a short time in any one place, my grandparents did not leave very much in the way of a paper trail but in every town I was able to verify some part of my mother's memories. In 1976 when she was 66, my mother and father took a trip through the mid-west, visiting all the places of her childhood and then she wrote a memoir entitled

"Ramblings of a Flickertail". It was fitting that I take the same trip at the same age. I was able to find schools, churches, and libraries (or pictures of the ones that had been razed) that she described as well as some of the houses she lived in. By far the best find was the picture in Great Bend.

#### HOW ARE SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBERS CODED? This comes from Sandra Hoover!

The Groups of digits in Social Security Numbers are assigned to geographical locations. Their assignment structure was similar to the way that zip codes were later assigned (in particular, groups of the first three digits increase from east to west across the continental USA as do the ZIP codes). The group of first three digits is called the Area Number. These area numbers were assigned according to state (or territorial) boundaries. There were some exceptions such as the series 700-729 was assigned to railroad workers regardless of location (this series of area numbers was discontinued in 1964 and is no longer used for new SSN's). Area numbers assigned prior to 1972 are generally an indication of the SSA office which originally issued the SSN. Since 1972 the area number in SSN's corresponds to the residential address given by the applicant on the initial application for the SSN. As the population grew in many areas the original range of number assignments was eventually used up and those original area number assignments have been augmented as required. Area numbers of "000" have never been used and all the original assignments were less than 585 (The only exception is for the 700-729 railroad worker series).
