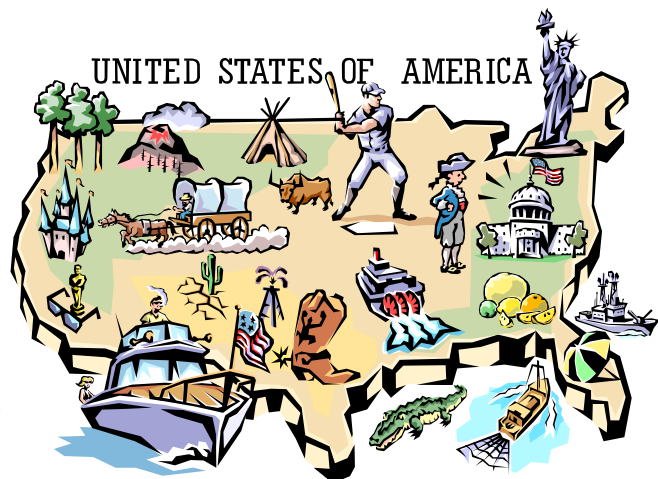

WEBSITE WORTH CHECKING:

Sites to See

Gold Bug SiteFinder <http://www.goldbug.com/map/sitefinder.html>

This will show you a place name location with a Google Map and/or a table with latitude and longitude readings. I checked out my high school as well as a cemetery in Kansas...wow! It is in satellite view or map with street names.



Google Book Search <http://books.google.com/googlebooks/about.html>

Read about how the Google Book Search works before searching the site. You will then understand which books are totally online, which books have some info online, etc.

Grave Indexes <http://www.findagrave.com/> <http://www.interment.net/> Both of these sites can locate cemeteries and even gravesites. You can enter information on a tombstone on the site of the cemetery of your ancestors for others to discover.

Immigration Timeline <http://memory.loc.gov/learn/features/immig/introduction.html>

A learning site from the Library of Congress. Clicking on the clock face on the left will give you a time line of events triggering immigration to the United States.

Genealogy Forms are available free online:

LDS Family History (www.familysearch.org) http://www.familysearch.org/Eng/Search/RG/frameset_rhelps.asp?Page=../research/type/Form.asp&ActiveTab=Type If PDF is listed after the form type, click on that to get a very nicely printable Adobe form. You cannot change the Adobe format on your computer but you can save it and print it out as you need.

Our old friend www.rootsweb.com http://helpdesk.rootsweb.com/get_started/charts_forms.html These forms can be downloaded and saved to use as needed. The Census blanks are good to help you read the forms as the print is very small online.

Remember that the content of sites is changing daily on those basic research sites we take for granted. Go back to those sites you have not checked in some time and see what is new. Use the Surname Search and try again. NEW STUFF shows up all the time.

And once again, I need to mention the importance of backing up your information. I just heard another horror story last week of lost computer files. Back up your genealogy software data files and those items you have saved in your genealogy folders. (You did make genealogy folders for each surname, didn't you?) Also, back up your important genealogy websites from your internet browser (Microsoft Explorer, Safari, or whatever you use) and any of your genealogy e-mails and those e-mail addresses for your genealogy contacts (I call them my Internet Cousins). Using a USB memory stick for your files makes this process very easy. You can rewrite over files as you back up with new information. The price on these devices has dropped dramatically and they are very transportable. You can have one dedicated just to genealogy.

I know I often repeat sites but these are so amazing that I want to be sure you go back and check them again. Let me know some of your favorite sites.

February Program



Detective Todd L. Shulman of the Napa Police Department stands before the screen on which he projected fascinating historical photographs of his predecessors while tracing the history of Napa County law enforcement from its origins to the present day. After passing from Mexican rule and through American military control, Napa County came into official existence in 1850, and the first board of supervisors appointed a sheriff and township marshals. Shulman exhibited several pictures of these early officers whose names are familiar because some descendants still live in this area. These family members were an excellent resource for him providing photos, newspaper clippings, and anecdotes.

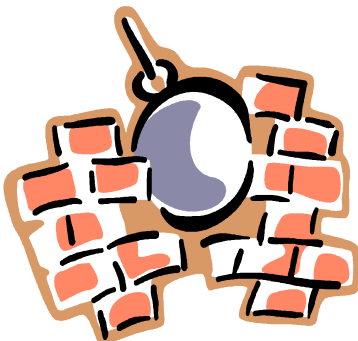
Shulman told intriguing stories of the early policing of Napa in the 19th century when constables patrolled the town. He displayed a picture of the last hanging on the Napa County Court House grounds before an invitation only crowd. Many photographs demonstrated the early 20th century expansion of city and county forces as the population grew. St. Helena and Calistoga had police departments while Yountville, Angwin and American Canyon were served by the Sheriff's Department. Women were associated early on with the agencies first as secretaries, dispatchers, and meter maids, and finally as sworn officers in the 1970's.

In the latter part of the last century and in recent times specialized police agencies have arisen to meet special needs. Napa State Hospital has the largest force in the county, 113 officers, because of the number of criminally insane patients treated there. The Wine Train has its own force, The Napa Railroad Police Department, with three sworn officers. Napa Valley College not only has its own Police Department, but also has a very large police academy which trains many cadets each year. Shulman emphasized the cooperation and the cross training among these agencies which provides excellent protection and service to the citizens.

Shulman answered many questions from the audience regarding his research methods, and sources. As he responded it became clear that he used many genealogical resources. We conclude that Detective Shulman is a genealogist or genealogists are detectives!

Founder of the Napa Police Historical Society in 2006, his extensive research has culminated in a book, "Napa County Police", published by Arcadia Publishing (www.arcadiapublishing.com) for \$19.95. It is available in local book stores. Shulman will donate the proceeds of the book to the Napa Police Historical Society.

The audience was most enthusiastic and appreciative of Detective Shulman's presentation.

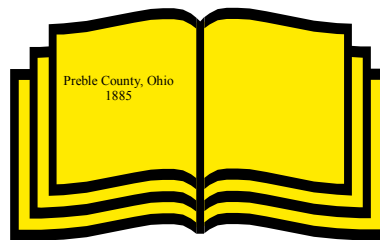

Finding City Directories

To learn what city directories exist for the locality and time period of your investigation, address a letter to the "Reference Librarian" at the public library for your city of interest. Include a self-addressed stamped envelope (SASE). You can get the address of that library from the "American Library Directory," published by the R. R. Bowker Co., available at your local library. Every library in America has this directory, which lists the addresses and phone numbers for all American libraries, whether public, private, special collection, college, or archives.

Although many libraries will not conduct any research for you, they will almost certainly answer your query. Then, contact a local genealogical society and see if a volunteer is available to go to the library and do some looking for you. Most genealogical societies render this service, for which a small donation to the society is customary.

EDUCATIONALLY SPEAKING

Please be aware the digitization of approved pension applications of widows of Civil War Union soldiers will offer unprecedented access to unique historic documents. These files held at the National Archives, provide a rich source of information about ordinary American citizens of the time and include supporting documents such as affidavits, depositions of witnesses, marriage certificates, birth records, death certificates and pages from family bibles.

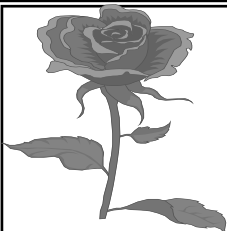
The partnership between the National Archives and the Genealogical Society of Utah (GSU) doing business as FamilySearch in conjunction with Footnote.com begins with a pilot project to digitize, index and make available the first 3,150 of the pension files. Upon successful completion of the pilot, GSU intends to digitize and index all 1,280,000 Civil War and later widows' files in the series.

There is an unbelievable treasure trove of genealogical information housed in the records of the National Archives: the vast majority of which genealogy enthusiasts have never seen.

Family Search will make the digitized materials available for free thru www.FamilySearch.org and in 4500 family history centers worldwide or on a subscription-based website operated by a third party, subject to National Archives approval. They will also be available at no charge in National Archives research rooms in Washington, DC and regional facilities across the country.

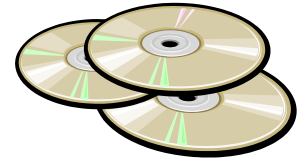
This agreement is one of a series of agreements that the National Archives has reached or will reach with partners to digitize portions of its holdings.

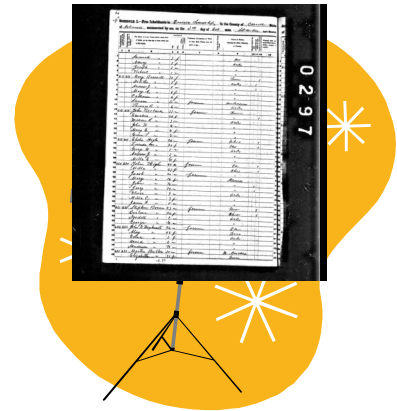
