Hot Tip From the book, *Google Your Family Tree*, by Daniel M. Lynch
If you have not seen this book, it is a great research assistant for us genealogists. It is
340 pages of useful information on using Google's amazing features.

How many times have you done a search only to pull up something you saw online 2 years ago? Common problem! Well, here is help from Mr. Lynch and Google: Choose "Advanced Search" to the right of the search box on the main Google screen. Fill in your search parameters as usual. Put all the words in the top box that you require, then put the exact words you want to find (perhaps a full name or county and state), then enter one or more of the words that will limit your search (example: genealogy, history, records) and then enter words that you do not want (helpful if your surname has another meaning).

Now to the good stuff: On the bottom of the Advanced Search page is the text box: "+ Date, usage rights, numeric range and more". Click on the plus sign and the next group of choices comes up. Under Date: you can choose your time frame. If you searched thoroughly last month, you can choose "past month" and get only results of your search posted within the month.

I also fill in the Region text box with United States. This eliminates some of the spam sites from other countries if they tend to show up. If you are searching on foreign soil, do not limit to the United States.

COLORADO HISTORIC NEWSPAPERS

Colorado newspapers (1859-1923), 75 newspapers in 20 cities, can be browsed by date, issue or keyword at http://www.coloradohistoricnewspapers.org>.

Historic newspapers are one of the most versatile and heavily used sources of information for researchers, genealogists, students and the general public. Feature stories, society news, classified picture advertisements, school and church announcements, news from surrounding towns, editorials and cartoons, all give the reader the sense of "being there." Often the papers contain historical information that is not available in any other source.

The Colorado Historic Newspapers Collection (CHNC) currently includes 147 newspapers published in Colorado from 1859 to 1923. CHNC contains over 477,000 digitized pages and is a joint endeavor of the Colorado State Library, the Colorado Historical Society, and generous donors throughout the state.

Editors note: This site is very easy to use, the digitized pages are clear and can be read easily without a magnifying glass. Kudos to Colorado.

MICHIGAN

Varied information about Michigan appears at http://seekingmichigan.org. This site also holds one million new Michigan Death Certificates, 1897-1920. Plus Civil War Service Records, Early Photography, Oral Histories, Maps, Naturalization Indexes and many other records. For the death certificates click on Discover when you reach the site. This site is easy to use and is searchable.

IN MEMORY OF Barbara Hicks

Barbara was a long time member of our society, she died on September 11, 2009 in Napa, CA. She staffed at our library and helped out with different projects, she will be missed.

Barbara was born in Oakland, CA and she was 83 years old.

September Program

Sharon Marangoni, society member, described her fascinating research in her attempt to find the birth mother of her late father, Robert Bookmeyer. Son of a teen age unwed mother, he was taken from an orphanage at about six months of age by foster parents who were able to adopt him when he was fourteen months old.

Sharon's grandparents regarded little Robert as their own son, and as an adult he was surprised to learn that he had been adopted. Sharon and her father made some attempts to trace his origins, but it wasn't until after Robert's death that she began to search in earnest.

Using Power Point Sharon displayed a number of documents which she was able to obtain with persistent efforts to penetrate various government bureaucracies. These records of birth and adoption and those of the Census Bureau led her to the family of the young mother, Dorothy Wittman, living in San Francisco where her father was a motorman. The home is still there, now occupied by another, unrelated family.



Sharon also learned a bit of information about the person who fathered Dorothy's child; his age (seven years older than Dorothy] and ethnic background. Sharon ultimately found the grave sites of Dorothy's parents in Colma, Ca. with dates of birth and death. It was a shock to learn that Dorothy also had a memorial marker there revealing that she died at the age of twenty one!

Like most genealogists Sharon hit some brick walls and has numerous unanswered questions. Why was Dorothy living in Los Angeles at the time of her death? What was the cause of death? Just who was the man who was the father of her child? The audience was very caught up in Sharon's story and had numerous questions and suggestions for further avenues of research. Sharon has agreed to keep the group informed of additional revelations.

It was a wonderful family history with both happy and sad endings. Thank you Sharon for sharing your family story.



Michael Muir Returns

for the October Program

Muir, Director of Access Adventure, a unique program which provides wheelchair accessible horse drawn carriages for handicapped persons to access rural and wilderness areas, displayed a video of the remarkable 3,000 mile carriage journey he made across the country with fellow handicapped persons.

At the time Michael was president of the United States Driving for Disabled, Inc.

Beginning in January 2001 from Mission San Diego, California, the group retraced pioneer trails first followed by Muir's ancestors, the Hanna family, who had begun the westward trek from Virginia several generations ago. Ending the journey in November in Washington, D.C. was a triumph of the will, effort and enthusiasm of a group of physically challenged persons representing several countries, Sweden, England, Germany, Mexico, as well as the United States, who joined the trek at intervals

The heroes of the journey were the wonderful spotted horses, bred by Muir, who pulled the carriages and bore the riders the complete distance and ended the journey in excellent condition. The horses delighted the many patients at the various hospitals and rehabilitation centers that the group visited along the way.

A major goal of the journey was to offer hope and inspiration to all physically and mentally challenged persons and to encourage them to become active in the out of doors. Muir said that the group members were welcomed with enthusiasm every where they went (except for hostile Tombstone, Arizona officials) and received much assistance along the way.

Michael Muir continued to travel ancestral trails. Two years later he drove along the trails followed by his great grandfather, John Muir, the great naturalist and founder of the

Sierra Club, who walked from Indiana to Florida and wrote of his observations in his book, A Thousand Mile Walk to the Gulf, published in 1867.

Muir became interested in his family genealogy through his horse breeding activities. When filling in the horse pedigrees he thought, "Why not do my own?" This interest led ultimately to retracing his ancestors' journeys.

Following his presentation Michael responded to many questions from his appreciative audience. He invited Interested person to visit his ranch. Information and directions are on his website, http://access-adventure.org/.
