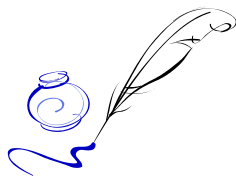

Jabber from Janice



Here is a fun tip that I saw in *Der Blumenbaum*, which is the quarterly of the Sacramento German Genealogy Society, V. 27, #3, as mentioned in Dick Eastman's Online Genealogy. Using Google, do a search entering : surname family history. For "surname" substitute one of your family surnames as in: griffith family history
When you see the list of "hits", scroll down until you find one called "Timeline for [surname] family history". Click on this site and enjoy searching through the list of significant dates. Hopefully, one will be just the one for your research. Below the link it will have "More timeline results". Click on this to continue the adventure.

I was asked to include information on saving files to a CD/DVD. It will depend on the version of Windows and the programs used. On Windows Vista, this is how I proceeded:

1. Put all the files I wished to burn to the disk in one easily found folder (I named mine "files to burn") by copying and pasting. These files can be a mixture of items (photos, documents, Adobe pdf). You should do this no matter what program or method used as it is easier to do them in a batch.
2. Put in unused CD in the disk drive (I used a CD-RW – Read/Write).
3. My computer then asked to format it and then asked what files to write to it and I chose the files in my folder.
4. I then looked at the CD to be sure it was what I intended. Done

There are many programs that can write to CD's. Some using a drag and drop technique.

Now this being said, I never use CD's . I transfer files to friends over the internet through e-mail or a special site such as facebook (which can be fairly public if not well managed by you), myfamily.com (from the Ancestry folks which you can send invitations out to those you wish to include on your site...more private), Picasa (a free Google program you can get from google.com) or one of the many photo sharing sites such as snapfish.com, flickr.com, shutterfly.com. If I am sending a good size number of items, it is easier to get an inexpensive memory stick or flash drive and fill it easily with many files and snail mail it off to the awaiting genealogist. This is probably the most secure method.

Genealogy Resources

- ◆ Genetree: You belong here—Genealogy for the electronic age. Genetree lets you forgo traditional genealogy research methods (dusty books and more library visits than you can shake a family tree at) for a free electronic database that helps you find your connections all over the world!
- ◆ Sorenson Molecular Genealogy Foundation: Growing the Genetic Family Tree One Branch at a Time—Also offering an online genealogy search engine, the SMGF site focuses primarily on DNA. Going off of a DNA database of samples submitted by volunteers, the site offers “participation kits” that lets you join the database, helping family find you even as you’re finding them.
- ◆ Mitosearch—This no frills search engine is ideal for those who want to quickly begin their genealogical research. You can also compare yourself to users of the site, offering a useful way to find new friends—and even old family.
- ◆ WorldGenWeb Project—While offering search engines like many sites, WorldGenWeb is much more specific, hosting specific websites for different regions across the globe. These regions are easy to search, and maintained by volunteers—and the site is always looking for those willing to help others in their genealogical quests.
- ◆ The Federation of East European Family History Societies—Named one of the 101 best sites for genealogy, this site offers a little of everything for genealogical researchers. Hosting resources for different regions and featuring heritage websites of different members, this site’s primary focus is more academic in nature, offering links to various genealogical journals and conferences from around the world.
- ◆ Access Genealogy: A Free Genealogy Resource—Another no-frills site, Access Genealogy has resources broken down into very specific areas. These include cemetery records, military records, census records, Bible records, and more!
- ◆ The Ancestry Insider—This site has one very specific purpose: to analyze all aspects of Ancestry.com and Familysearch.com. Sometimes this means defending them, and sometimes it means criticizing them...in all of their actions, however, the site serves as a valuable resource for keeping the world of genealogical research honest.
- ◆ FamilySearch—The aforementioned FamilySearch offers a quick, registration-free search for ancestors. It also helps you find your nearest family history center—ideal for those eager to pursue genealogy, and not knowing where to begin.
- ◆ Ancestry.com—Also featuring a free family search, Ancestry.com offers a good mixture of quick searches and in-depth records. Additionally, it offers “recent buzz” about genealogy from sources like the LA Times and USA Today, helping you keep track of rising trends in genealogy.

What is on our Shelves: A BOOK REVIEW



ONTARIO PEOPLE: 1796-1803

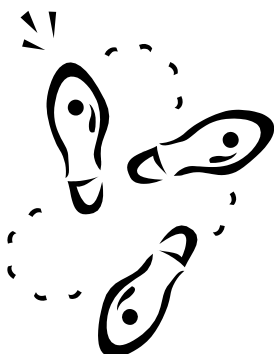
After the American Revolution, several thousand families came to settle in the western part of Quebec, later called Upper Canada, then Canada West and today Ontario. These settlers were former members of American Loyalist regiments, discharged British and German servicemen, and some civilians and refugees. They were offered grants of 200 acres of land on condition that they take an oath of allegiance and remain loyal to the British regime. The military and Loyalist arrivals who had come earlier received larger grants, generally in relation to their services to the Crown, their rank or status, and family size.

All settlers received certificates showing the location of the lots on which they were to clear land and build houses. First, however, it was necessary to establish who had the right to obtain title deeds, and in 1796 a proclamation was issued that required Loyalists and others to surrender their certificates in exchange for title deeds and to make a statement under oath in the district court as to their right to hold them.

Subsequently, thousands of settlers appeared before the magistrates in district courts throughout Upper Canada. The magistrates provided additional information in the records, which have been preserved in the National Archives of Canada and are usually called the District Loyalist Rolls of 1796. These rolls have been carefully transcribed for the first time by Dr. E. Keith Fitzgerald, who has supplemented the 4,000 entries with further data from his own research. Details supplied by the settlers, the magistrates, and by Dr. Fitzgerald now provide a rich source of information on the early inhabitants of Ontario. Some entries show, for example, relationships, deaths, military service, maiden names of married women, and remarriage of widows.

This dictionary describes the meaning and origin of the most important English place-names, tracing their development from their earliest appearance to the present day. Over 12,000 clear, concise entries cover names of cities and suburbs, towns and villages, counties and district, rivers and coastal features. Each entry includes the modern county in which the place-name is found, the name's most likely meaning and derivation, a typical earlier form with its date, and the name's spelling in the Domesday Book if it occurs there.

The entries are supplemented with a glossary of common elements in English place-names, a select bibliography, and maps showing boundaries of historical and modern (post-1974) counties. A fascinating introduction describes the development, formation, and significance of place-names.

Research Tips

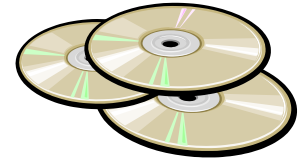
Interview the Living
