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1911 UK Census Adds Online Records

Ancestry.co.uk has finished adding the second part of the 1911 Census transcriptions. Records covering London, Lancashire, Yorkshire and 17 other counties are now fully searchable.

Unlike any previous censuses, this one provides the actual forms your ancestors filled in, complete with their handwriting and signatures.

Here's a full list of the areas that are now searchable: Channel Islands, Cheshire, Cornwall, Cumberland, Derbyshire, Devon, Durham, Isle of Man, Lancashire, Leicestershire, Lincolnshire, London, Norfolk, Northumberland, Nottinghamshire, Royal Navy, Rutland, Wales, Warwickshire, Westmorland, Worcestershire, Yorkshire-East Riding, Yorkshire-North Riding, Yorkshire-West Riding.

You can search the 1911 U.K. Census now at http://search.ancestry.co.uk/search/group/1911uki. You can search the index free of charge, but a Premium membership is required to view the actual census forms.

Thanks to my FamilyTree Magazine subscription (Feb., 2012, page 13) in "Self Improvement" by Lisa A. Alzo, I discovered that The Proof Standard has

been modified and is well worth reading and understanding. It holds us all to a higher standard. This comes from the website of The Board for Certification of Genealogists:

www.bcgcertification.org. The board has abandoned the "preponderance of evidence" concept. Information on this decision and the changes can be found at *http://www.bcgcertification.org/ resources/prepond.html.* We all would love to find genealogy information on the internet or in books using this standard. Following these guides would give us the opportunity to make a lasting and honest contribution to genealogy for our descendants.

Here is the information direct from the BCG website.

Proof is a fundamental concept in genealogy. In order to merit confidence, each conclusion about an ancestor must have sufficient credibility to be accepted as "proved." Acceptable conclusions, therefore, meet the Genealogical Proof Standard (GPS). The GPS consists of five elements:

1. a reasonably exhaustive search; 2. complete and accurate source citations;

3. analysis and correlation of the collected information; 4. resolution of any conflicting evidence;

5. a soundly reasoned, coherently written conclusion.

Each element contributes to a conclusion's credibility in a different way, described in the table below, but all the elements are necessary to establish proof.

Element of the GPS	Contribution to Credibility
Reasonably exhaustive search.	 Assumes examination of a wide range of high quality sources. Minimizes the probability that undiscovered evidence will overturn a too-hasty conclusion.
Complete and accurate citation of sources.	 Demonstrates the extent of the search and the quality of the sources. Allows others to replicate the steps taken to reach the conclusion. (Inability to replicate the research casts doubt on the conclusion.)
Analysis and correlation of the collected informa- tion.	 Facilitates sound interpretation of the data contributed by each source. Ensures that the conclusion reflects all the evidence.
Resolution of conflicting evidence.	• Substantiates the conclusion's credibility. (If conflicting evidence is not resolved, a credible conclusion is not possible.)

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On Our Library Shelves

Colonial Families of the Southern States of America, by Stella Hardy A History and Genealogy of Colonial Families Who Settled in the Colonies Prior to the Revolution

This classic work on colonial Southern families was originally published in 1911 and revised some forty-seven years later. It contains hundreds of genealogies giving names; dates of birth, marriage, and death; names of children and their offspring, with dates of places of birth, marriage, and death; names of collateral connections; places of residence; biographical highlights; and war records. Over 12,000 individuals are referred to in the text, all of them easily located in the alphabetical index. It must be borne in mind that this work deals strictly with the genealogical history of Southern families whose forebears were established in the colonies prior to the Revolution.

Researching Your Families History at the Massachusetts Archives On-Line or In Person www.sec.state.ma.us/arc/

The Archives Division of the Secretary of the Commonwealth's Office is the repository for Massachusetts records generated by state government. Archives holdings date from the beginning of the Massachusetts Bay Colony in 1628 and document the settlement of lands in Maine and Massachusetts, the arrival of immigrants, and the development of state government. Public records are not in the holdings of the Archives strictly because of inherent genealogical value, but since they often include references to so many Massachusetts people, these documents are a major resource for people engaged in the study of family history.

In addition to the archival records created by Massachusetts state agencies, the Archives has a limited selection of books and microforms to aid genealogists and other researchers.

Access to these materials is provided through the Research Room of the Massachusetts Archives at Columbia Point. It is open weekdays, 9 to 5, except on legal holidays.

Vital Records: 1841-1920

The Archives holds the registration books of births, marriages, and deaths for all Massachusetts cities and towns, 1841 through 1920. Municipal clerks submitted these registration pages to the state annually covering the vital records generated by their offices. While there is some variation in this information, generally the books provide names, dates, residences, occupations, and parental information. Some death records also include the place of burial. The Archives also holds microfilm of added entries and corrections to vital records for the same period. Later records in this collection will be transferred to the Archives at five-year intervals.

Vital records indices, dating 1841-1910, are available on the Massachusetts Archives website at www.sec.state.ma.us/arc. In the future, the 1911-1920 indices will also be available on the Massachusetts Archives website

Vital Records: Pre 1841

City and town clerks in Massachusetts are the custodians of pre-1841 vital records for their respective towns. The printed volumes of Vital Records Prior to 1850, which are organized by town, are available in many research libraries, including the Massachusetts State Library and the Massachusetts Archives.

The Genealogical Society of Utah has an active local records microfilming program; some of this film has been deposited with the Archives. While the types of records, their format, and the quality of the film varies for each municipality, the film includes records normally found in the municipal clerks' offices.

Among these are vital records and corresponding indices, marriage intentions, records of town meetings and boards of selectmen, and early proprietors' records. Occasionally church and cemetery records were microfilmed, along with genealogies.

Vital Records: Post 1920

Vital records after 1920 are located at the municipal clerks' offices or the Department of Public Health, Registry of Vital Records and Statistics (150 Mount Vernon Street, Dorchester, MA 02125). Researchers may contact the Registry of Vital Records at 617-740-2600, or through the DPH website www.mass.gov/dph. Indices of the DPH vital records volumes through 1971 are available at the Archives, although there are no copies of the actual records.

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Researching Your Family History at the Massachusetts Archives

Passenger Manifest (1848-1891) Contents

Massachusetts officials started recording the names of immigrants who arrived by ship in January of 1848, a procedure which continued until July of 1891, when federal records-keeping programs superseded those of the state. Although immigrants arrived at numerous Massachusetts ports, the Archives holds manifests for BOSTON ONLY. These are arranged chronologically according to the date when the ship arrived in port. The Archives holds the original manifests as well as the only microfilm copy available of these Passenger manifests. This collection has been cataloged as HS3.02/1990X (Registers of passengers arriving in Massachusetts ports) in the finding aids of the Massachusetts Archives.

The Archives has an alphabetical card index covering the same years as the registers and providing the same information. This includes the name, age, sex and occupation of the immigrant; the country of birth, last residence and the passenger list number. Also included is the name of the ship, and the date of its arrival in Boston.

Over one million immigrants came through the Port of Boston during this time period. Through the Archives Volunteer program, volunteers are entering this information into a computerized database. This is a long-term project. It is going to take several years to complete.

If the Surname you are interested in does not appear in the database you are welcome to come to the Archives and request the name through the Card Index or write us and we will check the card index for you. This database will be updated monthly.

Applicants for research-category certification are required to demonstrate that they fully understand the GPS and can apply it to research situations. The parts of an application portfolio that specifically test understanding and application of the GPS include the following:

 CGsm applicants: the kinship determination project and the conflicting or indirect evidence case study.

As a reminder, this is where you may find a certified person to assist in your research. You can enter specifications to ensure your researcher is an expert in a specific field.
