Cloud Computing

In today's world we expect or at least hope to have instant access to our information. One way of doing that is through Cloud Computing. We have already been using Cloud Computing in our e-mail programs and some of us have used Facebook, Twitter or other social networking applications or stored photos on the internet using Picasa. In this way we have put information on a "hard drive" that is not our own, allowing us (and others) to retrieve that information on a cell phone, iPad, your cousin's computer, a library computer or any device connected to the internet with a service provider and logon info. I can go to Starbucks for a latte and log onto my genealogy information on my iPhone using the iPhone app, Shrubs. There are many ways to use Cloud Computing for genealogy purposes.

Ancestry.com is one of the genealogy online communities using this technology. When you upload your family tree onto Ancestry's site, it is "in the Cloud." Others can access your information (with your permission) and share their research with you. Using Ancestry.com will require you to logon using a username and a password to secure your privacy. Any genealogy website that has you enter or upload information has stored that information in "the Cloud" for others to access. This is what makes those message boards and surname forums on www.rootsweb.com and www.genealogy.com so very useful.

I have addressed the use of passwords in past columns, but, as a reminder, make it difficult for others to determine, use symbols with numbers and letters. The symbol element (& # %) makes it more challenging. Some websites have specific requests for passwords, such as number of characters or use of at least one upper case so you will need to follow its guideline.

Most of us use Platform-as-a-Service (PaaS) – In this model of cloud computing, the provider provides a platform for your use. For my use, my e-mail is with Google, where the platform is provided and the e-mail is stored unless I choose to download it to Microsoft Outlook. At that point it is downloaded off the web onto my laptop.

The concerns are:

Where exactly is the data stored? Who has access? It must be stored in a physical location. Various countries have different laws regarding security and access. Read the agreement offered by your provider.

What is the backup plan; not only the provider's but your own? Do have your e-mail stored on your computer as well as on the provider site? Do you back up your own data on something other than your laptop? Those cute little USB memory sticks now come in large size storage at a very reasonable price. (Some genealogy programs such as RootsMagic even provide a program that will go on a memory stick and will allow you complete access to all your information, very helpful when visiting a library.)

This is a valuable substitute for nonexistent public vital records for South Carolina. Marriage entries identify the names of the bride and groom and their date of marriage, their parents names, residence, occupation, and station.

941.5 D4w Irish Names and Surnames

This work begins with an illuminating history of Irish names, followed by the great dictionary—700 pages of Irish names in two arrangements: English-Irish and Irish-English. Besides personal names, there is a section on Irish clan names, which are of great importance in tracing the early history of Irish families.

REFERENCE

929.1 D27da The Genealogist's Census Pocket Reference, Tips, Tricks & Fast Facts to Track Your Ancestors. Includes 1940 federal census information.

There's more to the census than those every-10-years counts. The government took special censuses (also called non-population censuses) to count unique segments of the population or create snapshots of communities. Taken variously during and between regular census years, these enumerations counted farms, veterans, factories, American Indians and other groups. Not all of these schedules survived, and many aren't yet available online. But if your ancestors are listed, you can learn things you might not find in any other record. These special censuses of select populations may have just the ancestor answers you need. Included in this book are the repositories that these schedules may be found.

929.3 E37r Military Bounty Land, 1776-1855

Military bounty land was promised as an inducement to enlist in service, remain for a longer period, or, years later, as a reward for serving. The mass of resulting documents, replete with nuggets of family data, is no longer shrouded in mystery. Author Christine Rose has spent a great part of her professional life working with these records. In a simplified format she shares her knowledge and insight into these collections: their background, the documents, and the related laws.

Tips for Visiting the Library Family History Library in SLC, Utah

Each year thousands of people travel substantial distances to access the wealth of genealogical resources contained at the Family History Library. Here are some quick tips to maximize your time in the library.

Planning Your Visit

We have assembled a <u>list of tips</u> that can help you get the maximum value from your visit to the Family History Library.

If you plan to visit the FamilySearch Library with a group, we offer **free library tours** and **group orientations**. *Sign your group up* today.

A short 10-minute orientation is available anytime the library is *open*.

Class Schedule

The library regularly holds workshops on the use of the library, its computer systems, family history records, and resources.

Specialized workshops teach patrons about methods of research and how to use various kinds of records, and computer classes educate patrons about the library's unique software programs. View the class schedule at, https://www.familysearch.org/locations/library class schedule

Before Your Library Visit

Organize Your Materials

Gather together information you have about your family. Talk to other family members and get copies of their information. Use a genealogy program like Personal Ancestral File to record information about your ancestors. Organize historical records (like birth certificates, marriage licenses, etc.) of your family by family group (such as a husband and wife and their children) or surname to make it easy for you to find the records.

See What's Already Been Done

See what other people have already discovered about your family by searching for your ancestors in collections of precompiled genealogies like Ancestral File or Pedigree Resource File on our website.

Decide What You Want to Learn

Decide which ancestor or family you want to learn more about. What specific questions would you like to know? Who are the parents of Warren Dodge? When did Frank Barnes die? Who are the children of Sarah Brewster and Thomas Barnes? Here are three important pointers:

It is easier to find information about people that lived more recently.

It is easier to work backward through time. For example, find death, then marriage, and then birth information.

Verify what you know, and then use it to look for what you don't know.

Identify Available Records

Identify the places where your ancestors lived or may have lived. Then search the Family History Library Catalog to see what records are available for that place. Make a list of the records that are likely to contain the answers to your questions. Be sure to include call numbers or film and item numbers. An easy way to do this is to print out the listings from the Family History Library Catalog.

Tips for Visiting the Library Family History Library in LLC, Utah

If you know in advance what microfilms you'll need at the library, you can order them before your visit. Library staff will retrieve them so that they will be ready for you when you arrive. Films listed in the Catalog as \"Vault\" films may take up to three days to retrieve.

Bring Your Information

If possible, bring any information you have that relates to the people or questions you are researching. These documents can be originals, copies, or scanned. This will provide important background information as you search.

Visit with a Reference Consultant

The Family History Library has many reference consultants with expertise in genealogical research. Professional research consultants are available at counters on each floor to consult with you on your research and point you in the right direction. They can create a research strategy to help you find the information you want to learn. Getting their help can save you substantial time. There are also volunteers who can help you once you have gotten direction from a consultant. Remember, everyone knows different things, so don't be afraid to ask your question to more than one person.

Record what you find

As you look at a film or book, make sure to write down the name of the source you searched, the film or book number, and note what you found, or what you did not find, in that source. Be prepared to capture what you found by writing it down; taking a picture; or using printers, copiers, and scanners available in the library. This will keep you from looking in the same places over and over again. There is a small use fee for anything you decide to print.
