This came to me in my newsletter from Silicon Valley Computer Genealogy Group. I am taking genealogy classes through Campbell Adult Continuing Education and Richard is my current instructor. He agreed to allow me to share his letter.

Dear genealogy friends:

Sometimes we wonder if what we do makes a difference. As we were sitting at our group's booth/table at a recent genealogy conference, we talked with conference-goers about how they were enjoying the conference classes. One mentioned that she'd been in a Google Books class taught by my wife some time ago. She said she'd gone home and tried a book search herself and had great success.

At the seminar where my wife taught the well-attended Google Books class, she also was supposed to teach another class, but no one came to it. She was discouraged that she'd prepared a class no one attended, even though the Google Books class seemed to go well enough.

Sometimes it may seem that our family history efforts go unnoticed and unappreciated by others in our family -- as if we're preparing a class no one will attend or writing a book no one will read. Some in our family who don't understand the impact of genealogy may think we're a bit obsessed. If we're lucky, they indulge us, odd as it may seem to them.

We need to remember not to judge ourselves by others' apparent acceptance or rejection of our interests. Rather, we can take pleasure in each incremental bit of information we learn, and we can enjoy the journey. Someday we may be pleasantly surprised to learn that our efforts have been meaningful to others, even if they don't know it yet.

#### Mary's Book Corner

I had a very pleasant surprise the other day when I searched our local County Library's catalog for a book called *Finding Family: My Search for Roots and the Secrets in My DNA*. I didn't find it, but another book called *Finding Family*, a juvenile novel by Tonya Bolden came up so I ordered it. It is a delightful story of a twelve year girl at the turn of the 20th century learning about her complex family and coming to terms with it. Of even greater interest than the story itself is the "hook" that the author uses. Tonya Bolden collects vintage photographs and she chose many unidentified ones to illustrate this story; assigning them names, relationships, and stories of their own. If you are still trying to figure out the relationships, at the end, she provides a wonderful pedigree chart to explain it all. You'll find the book shelved in the Children's room.

We are now a FamilySearch Affiliate Library!

Just what does that mean? It means that now when you want to order a film from the Family History Library in Salt Lake City, you can specify that it be

sent to our library where you can use it to further your research. Films on short term loans are available for 90 days, beginning when they are shipped, at a current price of \$8.08. It is now easier than ever to order films. Go to the FamilySearch.org website, find the film you want to borrow, and then order online, paying with your credit/debit card, or through your PayPal account. You will be notified by email when the film has been shipped. We are working on getting the printer part of our microfilm reader/printer repaired but in the meantime, you will be surprised at what good copies you can obtain using your digital camera to take screen shots. In the future FamilySearch hopes to extend access to many subscription websites to Affiliate Libraries as they do to local Family History Centers. They are currently negotiating with their contractors towards that goal.

### MEXICAN GENEALOGY

The FHL's coverage of civil registration records has a few gaps: The states of Baja California, Nayarit, Quintana Roo, Sinaloa and Tabasco haven't been filmed; some Morelos records are missing; Campeche records were mostly destroyed; and most Tabasco records were burned. You may need to seek your Quintana Roo ancestors in the mi-

crofilm for Yucatan. Note, too, that the states of Guerrero and Oaxaca archived their records at the district level rather than the *municipio* level; the FHL's research outline for Mexico has details on locating these records (www.familysearch.org/eng/search/rg/guide/mexico.asp).

As with parish records, the information recorded in civil registrations can be quite extensive. In addition to the basics about the date, place, child and parents, birth records may include the parents' ages and birthplaces, and even facts about the grandparents. Especially in later records, marriage entries might contain the couple's ages and birthplaces, occupations, and parents' and grandparents' names. Death records may list the spouse and parents of the deceased. Even if your ancestor was born before civil registration started, you might find key genealogical facts about him or her in death records.

The usefulness and availability of other Mexican records pale in comparison to parish re cords and civil registrations. But if you come up against roadblocks, investigate these resources:

- Cemetery Records: Few cemetery records have been transcribed or microfilmed, so you'll need to try *municipio* archives, local parishes and historical societies or libraries. The FHL has records for some cemeteries in the *Distrito Federal* (Mexico City, the Federal District).
- Censuses: Except for 1930, Mexico lacks access to comprehensive national censuses of the sort US researchers are used to. That 1930 enumeration—the only post-independence census whose records are open to the public—is on FHL microfilm and online at (pilot.familysearch.org). For Mexico's colonial period, you can consult special censuses, such as that of Spaniards living in Mexico City in 1689, or the various *padrones* (censuses) taken since 1752. *Padrones* were often for special groups, such as men eligible for military service, and continued into the early years of Mexico's independence. The FHL has 110 volumes of these censuses, from 1752 to 1865, on 41 microfilms grouped by district.
- Divorce records; Don't bother looking for divorce records prior to 1917, when divorce was first legalized in Mexico. Whereas marriages appear in civil registrations, divorces get recorded in *municipio* courts. Contact the clerk of the town or *municipio* where the divorce took place to find them.
- Immigration: The FHL has passenger lists of early Spanish colonists in Mexico as well as some passport records of immigrants arriving between 1821 and 1873. Records of Mexicans leaving for the United States didn't begin until the early 1900s, when the first immigration service were sit up in border towns. The National Archives and Records Administration (*archives.gov*) keep these records; some are on Ancestry.com and Footnote.
- Local histories: Local chronologists kept histories of most towns dating back to colonial days. You can find some of these at the FHL and at major libraries.
- Land records: The FHL has some microfilmed land records, the originals of which are mostly at the national archives in Mexico City. The Texas General land Office in Austin (www.glo.state.tx.us/archives/archives.html) houses original 1720-to-1836 land titles for what's now Texas. Check the New Mexico state archives (www.nmcpr.state.nm.us/archives/ ancestors.htm) for 1693-to1821 Spanish land records and 1821-to1845 Mexican records for present-day New Mexico.

#### VERY IMPORTANT MESSAGE TO ALL MEMBERS

Furthermore, should payment be received after that date, a new application and a new Electronic Consent form will be required to rejoin the Society (per Standing Rules). Your membership is important to us, so please take notice of all the upcoming reminders in the WinePress.

You may notice that the old form for renewing membership, which was sometimes used as an application, has been deleted from this newsletter. If you know someone who would like to join the Society, please have him/ her appear at the library or go online to <u>napavalleygenealogy.org</u> and complete the form (joint membership requires both individual's names). Since dues are collected annually July 1, new members pay half price if joining us January through June.
