
### 8-11 May 2013 Building New Bridges

Mildred Batty Olinger. Apparently, she wrote several letters to Lieutenant Colonel John H. Gardner, the recruiting officer in Portland, Oregon (she lived in Roseburg). She wrote regarding her desire to drive a truck or an ambulance for support abroad during WWI and states she had been in communication with the Red Cross and both she and her sister wish to enlist (that would be my other great aunt, Goldie Batty Cheney). She states she is a strong girl and past 18 and used to hard work. Also, she writes: "Both my sister and I know something about automobiles." The entire letter was reproduced in the San Francisco Chronicle on March 22, 1918. She ended the letter with a P.S. "I have wanted to go and have nothing else in view for the future, only this. If I were a boy I would have joined long ago with my brothers."

Well, I was amazed at the tenacity and courage of my Aunt Millie. She ended up living with her two sisters across the street from my parents. My children as youngsters had the privilege of knowing both of their great great aunts and their great grandmother, who all lived together for several years. They certainly were impressed with the letter. So check out those newspapers, you never know what will turn up.

### ROOTS TECH CONVENTION

As many of you know, on March 17th Karen Burzdak and I, Sharon Marangoni, took a wonderful 16-hour train ride to Salt Lake City for *RootsTech*, a convention in which the focus is how to use technology to better our genealogy. It was a fun-packed 3 days with myriads of speakers and presentations. There were 6700 people at *RootsTech*, NOT including the 2000 young people just getting started in genealogy! The youngsters all came on Saturday, the last day of the conference and apparently were in a different area of the Salt Palace Convention Center, as we did not see a lot of them. It was very exciting to see young people getting involved. I am making a big assumption that not all of those 2000 were Latter Day Saints. I certainly could be wrong! One of the main focuses in the conference was finding ways to get young people involved in genealogy and to foster a lifetime hobby for them.

The conference was great with lots of vendors and good information, including tips on organization, search engines, preservation, how to use mobile devices in research, and more.

It will certainly be worth going again next year. *RootsTech 2014* will be at the Salt Palace Convention Center February 6, 7, and 8, 2014. The nearest hotel is the Salt Plaza Hotel, which is right next to the Family History Library and across from the Mormon Temple. If you think this is something you might want to do next year, I would suggest making reservations now as the hotel will fill up fast!

# Mary's Book Corner

I couldn't find a book with genealogical connections this time, so I'm going to stretch it a bit. The book The World's Strongest Librarian by Josh Hanagarne is a memoir of Tourette's, faith, strength, and the power of family. The author, Josh Hanagarne, is a librarian at the Salt Lake City Library, and the day after I finished reading his book, I flew to Salt Lake City to do some research. Out of curiosity I jumped on the free tram and went to the City Library. Indeed, it is a beautiful and functional building; I rode the glass elevator up to the third floor, and who should be manning the reference desk but Josh Hanagarne, himself. We chatted for a few minutes; he was surprised that I had read his book because it will not be released until May of this year, and he confessed that he was a little nervous about his first TV interview scheduled for the next day. In other words, he was very much like his book: warm and friendly and willing to admit that he has had obstacles to overcome in his quest for a productive and satisfying life. I enjoyed reading his story immensely and particularly liked the structure, or gimmick, if you like, of his table of contents, using the Dewey Decimal System to show the topics covered. ## From our Shelves, a BOOK REVIEW

North Carolina Wills: A Testator Index, 1665-1900. Corrected and revised edition, by Thornton W. Mitchell

This is an index to more than 75,000 persons who died and left wills in North Carolina between 1665 and 1900. With the possible exception of census records, it is the single most important finding-aid in North Carolina genealogy. In one alphabetical sequence it lists the names of the testators, the county in which their wills were proved, the date of probate, the precise location of the recorded copy of the will in each of the counties (by book and page number), and the location of the original will. Dr. Mitchell has also provided a concise history of the probate records of all 107 North Carolina counties, giving the date of the county's formation, the territory it was formed from, the dates wills were first filed and recorded, the various record book designations, the status of the records, and the location of the original, recorded and copied wills.

# In Our Father's Footsteps


My brothers and I decided to honor our highly esteemed father on his 106th birthday. Of course he's been dead now for 34 years, yet we strive to keep his memory fresh in heart and mind.

This year we chose a new approach: take photo enlargements of his boyhood days and, using them as references and introductions, visit those places where he grew up in the small town of Kewanee, Illinois – to walk in his youthful footsteps, visiting the streets, stores, schools, factory, YMCA, library, home, and relatives who nurtured him.

We were overwhelmed by the welcome wherever we went, in spite of his long absence. We walked his streets and showed photos of his first 30 years. When we gave copies to the people living in the home of his birthplace, they entertained us while we talked of the house in his day. The YMCA gave us a tour where he once played basketball and learned to swim. The caretaker of the city cemetery located his grave, while providing a commentary of the town folk buried nearby. The newspaper editor looked up articles about his sports achievements. His high school principal provided a tour of his old classrooms. And the library located his school yearbooks for us in their Henry County Genealogical Society's reserve room.

It was an inspiring visit. We felt a need to express our gratitude to the town for clarifying our awareness of its influence on our dad. So upon returning home, we team-wrote his "Hometown Biography" including his parentage and genealogy. We shared copies with his extended family and sent a copy for the Kewanee Library Genealogy Reserve through the Henry County Genealogical Society. The Genealogical Society's president brought the addition to the attention of its members, including a request for further research of the names Patterson and Ashlee. We are now members of the Henry County Genealogical Society, enjoying their support in our ongoing historical search.




