Members from Napa, Lake, Sonoma, Marin and Vallejo-Benicia Genealogy Societies who attended the Spring Seminar in Santa Rosa, met during the lunch break to brainstorm on how we could combine our efforts to promote and improve our societies.

On June 24, we hosted a follow-up meeting at our library. As a result, we have created the North Bay Family History Alliance (NBFHA). The focus of our first meeting was to share speaker resources. Each society in attendance provided other attendees with their speaker information and meeting strategies. We will meet again in October.

In a further effort to collaborate with other genealogical and historical societies, Mary Herzog and Carole Fisher joined with the Napa Valley Historical Society to present "Tracing Your Roots." The 3-hour seminar was designed to introduce research techniques to beginning genealogists. Emphasis was placed on interviewing techniques and creating family history sheets with Ancestry.com.

Do you Blog? I have been very curious about this internet communication technique. According to www.ask.com (one of my favorite sites for getting quick answers to any question), "A blog is a frequent, chronological publication of personal thoughts and Web links."



It is a journal kept online and most often open to the public. It is typically an online, ongoing work of a person that allows others reading the blog to leave comments. I subscribe to a few and find them very useful. One I enjoy is from a new quilting friend that taught a class for beginners. She is quite talented, and I enjoy seeing the images of her projects and the how-to instructions. She also posts upcoming items of interest and expects comments and interaction on her site. There are many genealogy blogs with familiar authors out in the wide world of the internet.

Now, to my point in bringing this up, would this be a good way to work on a collaborative genealogy? Why not start a blog on your work and see if you can entice information out of those genealogists researching your same surnames. Listed below are some blogs for you to explore to get the idea of blogging. Next newsletter we will talk about getting started with your own blog.

Using http://www.classic.myfamily.com/, very simple as it is already configured and I (or anyone else that receives a link) can add photos, news, documents, family trees, etc. I limit it to family members who can invite other family members. I am the administrator which requires very little effort and a small yearly fee. We have had this site up and running for almost 20 years. I have decided to start using it as a place to share my research on my lines as well as my husband's. It won't do much good just sitting on my shelf or on my computer, so I am getting it out there.

Mary's Book Corner

Shaking the Family Tree: Blue Bloods, Black Sheep, and Other Obsessions of an Accidental Genealogist, by Buzzy Jackson.

Today's book doesn't fit into any of the standard categories of genealogy books, i.e., How To, Memoir, Family Trees, etc., so, for the best description, here's the quote from the book jacket:

"WHO ARE YOU AND WHERE DO YOU COME FROM?"

As a historian, Buzzy Jackson thought she knew the answers to these simple questions—that is, until she took a look at her scrawny family tree. With a name like Jackson (the twentieth most common American surname), she knew she must have more relatives and more family history out there, somewhere. Her first visit to the Boulder Genealogy Society brought her more questions than answers . . . but it also gave her a tantalizing peek into the fascinating (and enormous) community of family-tree huggers and after-hours Alex Haleys.

In *Shaking the Family Tree*, Jackson dives headfirst into her family gene pool: flying cross-country to locate an ancient family graveyard, embarking on a weeklong genealogy Caribbean cruise, and even submitting her DNA for testing to try to find her Jacksons. And in the process of researching her own family lore (Who was Bullwhip Jackson?) she meets legions of other genealogy buffs who are as interesting as they are driven, from the boy who saved his allowance so he could order his great-grandfather's death certificate, to the woman who spends her free time documenting the cemeteries of Colorado ghost towns.

Through Jackson's research, she connects with distant relatives, traces her roots back more than 250 years, and in the process comes to discover—genetically, historically, and emotionally—the true meaning of "family" for herself.

It is a delightful book; I learned some new things as well as just enjoying it thoroughly.


