A Message from our President

Question: What does a hot day in summer have in common with a rainy day in winter? Answer: The opportunity to organize your genealogy, of course!

In preparation for last Thanksgiving dinner, I had assembled all my loose genealogy papers and thrown them into the lime green plastic tub purchased from Target, which elicited two sets of memories: putting the grandsons (barely able to sit alone) in it in place of a wading pool, and the August 24 earthquake causing the chipped edges on one side. Still usable.

To keep myself from becoming overwhelmed by this daunting task, as well as quickly giving up, I did a very simple sort: Arkansas (me); Massachusetts (husband); Educational; and one specific, very small family to complete VERY soon. I also completed my two-year task of organizing six inches of paperwork collected and unsorted, which started before the Society building was purchased in 1991. The method I used initially to complete this project was a chronological sort. It quickly became apparent that there were DUPLICATES as well as papers that were not necessary for the Society to retain. Done!

Within the next several months, the Board will adopt a retention policy that will include the process of scanning records for easy computer access as will as cloud preservation.

Advice from Thomas MacEntee's book, *The Genealogy Do-Over Workbook*: "Set aside those crucial one to two hours a month and commit to a plan to get organized." Point well taken.


There is no July Program, off for this month.

Statutes at Large

"The Law Library of Congress has digitized this collection of laws passed by the United States Congress and aims to make historic Statutes at Large accessible to the public in this ongoing project."

Just doing a surname in the search box turned up many pages. Combining a surname with other appropriate terms will narrow a search. Bills of relief, hearing for pensions, bills presented for reimbursement of road work, petitions presented before Congress are a few of the items that could mention an ancestor. I was very fascinated by what items were included and the details, especially in searching the earlier records. The short synopsis of the item often contained the full name. Search terms found are in bold, which makes skimming through easier.

How to Start a SIG (Special Interest Group)

This is a fantastic way for members to exchange information as well as discover new methods of research, learn new skills, etc. And it's all for free.

This information is an abstraction of an online website entitled "Establishing a DNA Interest Group." More details to create a DNA group can be found at http://www.geniel.com.au/blog/73-establishing-a-dna-interest-group.

- 1. Starts with one person who invites a couple of people to attend a meeting.
 - a The group will evolve over time.
- 2. At the first meeting, determine the following:
 - a Is the SIG designed for members only
 - b Is it designed to find new members (DNA DIGs are especially enticing to non-members who might later become members of the Society)
 - c One subgroup or two or more?
 - In the case of DNA SIG's, researchers? Non-testers? Already-tested?
 - 2. Or can the SIG accommodate all levels of knowledge and experience?
- 3. All groups need a leader, but determine whether leadership will be the function of one per son, rotate positions? The level of responsibility
- 4. When and where will the group meet?
- 5. Assign different areas of responsibility early on (notification, topic selection, publicity, etc.)
- 6. Meeting frequency and duration
 - a This differs by SIG, but DNA groups are recommended to meet monthly
 - b Meeting by Internet email?
 - c Meeting length of two hours is about right
- 7. Meeting content
 - a Casual
 - b Presentation
 - c Handouts
 - d Allow time for questions and meeting content suggestions
- 8. Attendees
 - a Use sign-in sheet including contact information
 - b Name tags

This should be enough information to get any group started. If meeting at the library, please make sure that you are meeting at a time that is not used by other groups and that the newsletter publisher can make note of those times in the WinePress.

Family Tree Maker and RootsMagic

By now we've all heard that Ancestry.com will be discontinuing its Family Tree Maker software. Never Fear...Ancestry.com will be working with, but has not bought out, RootsMagic in the near future.

You'll be able to search and sync RootsMagic to Ancestry.com, and directly import your Family Tree Maker files and download online trees from Ancestry.com to RootsMagic.

Family Tree Maker should work online with Ancestry.com through 2016, and the current version of RootsMagic (version 7) will include free upgrades that will soon be able to do all this interfacing. What this means is that:

- If you have Family Tree Maker, you will need to consider your options about what to move to when it becomes obsolete.
- If you have a version of RootsMagic that is older than version 7 and you want to keep up with the latest Ancestry.com options, you'll need to upgrade.
- If you have RootsMagic 7, you are good to go.

How Many Backup Copies of Important Files do You Need?

Here's the old data center 3-2-1 rule-of-thumb for backing up:

- 3. 3 copies of anything you care about—Two isn't enough if it's important.
- 2. 2 different formats—Example: Dropbox plus DVDs or hard Drive plus Memory Stick or CD plus Crash Plan, Carbonite, or more.
- 1. 1 off-site backup—If the house burns down, how will you get your memories back?
