

DNA TESTING

Three companies stand out in the new genealogy craze -- DNA testing:

Family Tree DNA, 23andMe and <u>Ancestry.com</u> DNA. If you test with different companies, expect different information as to your ethnic make up, they each have separate control groups they use for comparison. From what I have heard, 23andMe does the most accurate testing and comparisons. Many people test with all three. If you have decided to jump in with both feet, this Wiki on Family Search is extremely helpful in explaining the mystery of DNA for genealogy and the various testing programs.

It surprised me that my DNA was different from my brother. But understanding the DNA inheritance helped reminded me that we each have 50 % DNA contribution from each of our parents. The 50% you get from your mother is different from the 50% your older sister gets. Only identical twins will get the same DNA. Further down the line, you get 25% from each of your grandparents, 12.5% from each of your great grandparents, etc. I credit Christine Bell Green, PLCGS, with clarifying the background info on testing. She has shared her lecture notes on --

Now to find those cousins you need to submit your DNA to a project. I used the Cox Surname project which traces the male lineage with my brother's YDNA sample. The mtDNA follows the female line but although interesting gives less genealogical information. With the advent of autosomal DNA testing you can match up any surname so you may need to join many projects not just your surname but also other surnames in your family tree. These sites will usually have an email address so you may contact and share information with a potential "cousin" and hopefully tear down a brick wall.

My favorite, Cyndi's list, has many suggestions on DNA projects.

If you did your sample through Ancestry, that site can also do a comparison with their subscribers. Submit using the information on the DNA testing kit to the Ancestry site.

Pennsylvania Library Digital Records

Spotlight: Whitehall Township Public Library, Pennsylvania

Whitehall Township is located in Lehigh County, in eastern Pennsylvania. The Whitehall Township Public Library website provides a number of resources under the Digital Library tab.

Samuel & Rosa Kern Letter Collection

Providing a glimpse into life in Victorian-era Pennsylvania between 1879 and 1887, the correspondence between Samuel Kern and his wife, Rosa, covered various topics including sports, social activities, illness, education, and weather.

Historic Picture Collection

This collection contains historic photographs of Whitehall Township and the surrounding area.

Civil War Grave Registrations

Civil War Grave Registrations for Lehigh County were collected in the 1930s by the Works Progress Administration (WPA). While most of the veterans in the database fought in the Union Army, some were Confederate Army veterans.

Historic Book Collection

This collection currently contains four items, including a volume of transcribed death records (1894-1905) held by the Monroe County, Pennsylvania, Court House.

Whitehall High School Yearbook Collection

Whitehall High School yearbooks from 1922 through 2014 can be browsed by year or searched.
