I thoroughly enjoyed "It's Al Relative" by A.J. Jacobs. It is unlike any other book that I have come across about genealogy and family history research. A.J. In this case, he did his DNA and then became fascinated by the idea that we are all related to one degree or another. The book chronicles how he managed to gather together enough volunteers to put on an event which attracted 3700 people, not counting the ones attending 44 simultaneous reunions around the world. Conchita Marusich will speak about a book she has published called In Search of William Wolfskill: Journey to Find the Legacy. William was her great-great-grandfather and a trail blazer over the Santa Fe Trail and the Old Spanish Trail. Famous for his Wolfskill citrus orchards and vineyards, William is recognized as the founder of California's citrus industry and is also seen as an important figure in the growth of California's early wine business.

The book combines two stories. The first part of every chapter is Williams's story, which recounts his amazing life. Conchita spends a whole chapter on his expedition over the Old Spanish Trail which included George Yount, who later founded Yountville. The second part of every chapter tells about her journey of discovery as she and Rich, her husband, retraced William Wolfskill's footsteps. Throughout the book, she includes information that helped her dig deeply into her family's roots and find pieces of her genealogical puzzle.

Cloud Computing

In today's world we expect or at least hope to have instant access to our information. One way of doing that is through *Cloud Computing*. We have already been using *Cloud Computing* in our e-mail programs and some of us have used Facebook, Twitter or other social networking applications or stored photos on the internet using Picasa. In this way we have put information on a "hard drive" that is not our own allowing us (and others) to retrieve that information on a cell phone, iPad, your cousin's computer, a library computer or any device connected to the internet with a service provider and logon info. I can go to Starbucks for a latte and log onto my genealogy information on my iPhone using the iPhone app, *Shrubs*. There are many ways to use *Cloud Computing* for genealogy purposes.

Ancestry.com is one of the genealogy online communities using this technology. When you upload your family tree onto Ancestry's site, it is "in the Cloud". Others can access your information (with your permission) and share their research with you. Using Ancestry.com will require you to logon using a username and a password to secure your privacy. Any genealogy website that has you enter or upload information has stored that information in "the Cloud" for others to access. This is what makes those message boards and surname forums on www.rootsweb.com and www.genealogy.com so very useful.

I have addressed the use of passwords in past columns but as a reminder, make it difficult for others to determine, use symbols with numbers and letters. The symbol element (& # %) makes it more challenging. Some websites have specific requests for passwords such as number of characters or use of at least one upper case so you will need to follow their guideline.

Most of us use Platform-as-a-Service (PaaS) – In this model of cloud computing, the provider provides a platform for your use. For my use, my e-mail is with Google where the platform is provided and the e-mail is stored unless I choose to download it to Microsoft Outlook. At that point it is downloaded off the web onto my laptop.

The concerns are:


Where exactly is the data stored? Who has access? It must be stored in a physical location. Various countries have different laws regarding security and access. Read the agreement offered by your provider. What is the backup plan; not only the providers but your own? Do have your e-mail stored on your computer as well as on the provider site? Do you back up your own data on something other than your laptop? Those cute little USB memory sticks now come in large size storage at a very reasonable price. (Some genealogy programs such as RootsMagic even provide a program that will go on a memory stick and will allow you complete access to all your information; very helpful when visiting a library.)

PRESERVATION TIME





"Snapscan" is a quick and simple paper scanner now installed at the NVGS Library.

Get ready to scan and protect those important photos and documents.

The scanner will scan 20 double-sided pages or 40 single-sided pates in under a minute. These can then be converted into PDF format if you wish. The scanner can do both sides at once on all photos and documents. The documents can be either typed or written. To protect paper that is delicate or wrinkled, it can be place in a transparent sleeve to go through the scanner.

Certain library staff have been trained to assist you during this process.

To Prepare:

- You will need to make an appointment with one of these staff members.
- Bring a memory stick ready to receive your scanned documents and/or photos. You should determine file labels for the items to organize them for easy retrieval. A method to label your files is by Surname, an event or just "unknown photos." This step can be done at the Library with the help of the staffer if you have a list of the titles you would like to use.
- Remove all staples, paper clips and any other foreign object from the photos or documents.
- Heavier photos on cardboard will need to be copied to paper before they can be scanned. This can be done on a flat-bed scanner which is available at the library.

With your photos and documents stored on a memory stick you can then view, print or read them on a computer. You can also copy the items to another memory stick to be stored in a safe deposit box or given to someone to be maintained safely.

The cost for this service will be a flat rate of \$30.00 for a half hour of staff time.
