

While we are all isolating in our homes, now is a good time to continue genealogical research, organize those photos and maybe even preserve and digitize important photos and documents.

RESOURCES

Research beyond **Family Search** and **Ancestry** should include **Heritage Quest** which can be accessed through the County Library at *countyofnapa.org* in the Database section. For newspapers and other collections check the Library of Congress at *loc.gov*. Google also has an archive of newspapers.

Consider preserving and sharing family photos and stories by scrap booking family history. For archival supplies check *Gaylord.com*. They also provide information of preserving family heirlooms. *Photopostos.com* offers self-adhesive envelopes for photo postcards. *smile.amazon.com* also offers many types of archival items.

Your scrap books can be professionally printed for sharing with family. Few websites include: *shutterfly.com* and *snapfish.com* and *walgreens.com*.

TIP

Many gravestones list the date of death and the age at death. The birth date can be calculated from this information: for example death May6, 1889 at the age of 71 years, 7 months, 9 days.

- a. write the death year, month, day as: 18890506
- b. subtract the age at death: 710709
- c. this gives the figure: 18179797
- d. now subtract 8870
- e. the result is 18170927
- f. the birth date is 1817, 9th month (Sept), 27th day or 27 Sept, 1817

Before exploring online databases and traveling to repositories, every genealogist can find inspiration for family research close to home in photos, letters, documents, heirlooms, trinkets, and oral histories. These home sources provide the precious foundation for a lifetime of study. Mary Herzog will share how her genealogical journey evolved with the aid of home sources and ways that we can make the most of what lies hidden in our closets and drawers

Mary began her research twenty-seven years ago when her husband received a letter asking for family information from an unknown cousin. The timing was perfect because she had just retired from over thirty years with the Public Health Department and was looking for something to do. Her special interests include research on her Azorean ancestry, visiting with her many cousins in England who did not emigrate, and finding DNA cousins.

FOUND MY GREAT GRANDMOTHER IN MASONIC CEMETERY BOOKS

My great grandmother Sarah Jane Ward Gilman was born 25 December 1843 in China, Penobscot, Maine. She was the youngest of four – having three brothers: Martin Emery, born 1835; Olin Weston, born 1837 and Albert Melville, born 1840. Over the 1860's these four removed to Columbia, Tuolumne, California. The brothers later removed to various locations throughout northern Nevada and Lassen county California following prospecting, lumbering and stock raising. The Ward brothers and their sister [after having divorced my great grandfather, Joseph A. Gilman 4 March 1885 in San Francisco] made their home in Reno, Washoe, Nevada.

All four siblings died in Reno within two years of each other, 1912-1914: My great grandmother Sarah Jane Ward Gilman and her brother Albert Melville dying a mere 4 months apart, 16 September 1913 and 30 December 1913 respectively. The Ward families – direct, extended and collateral – are buried in Reno's Masonic Memorial Gardens. All three Ward brothers are listed as buried there and have respective headstones. But there is no cemetery record nor headstone of sister Sarah; but her obituaries and funeral documents say she's buried here. The cemetery secretary suggests, "go to the Masonic Grand Lodge Office and ask to see their cemetery books, they keep their own."

I thought – 'Masonic ... humm, secret this? secret that? are they like sealed Mormon records, for Masonic eyes and ears only? Is it members only?' While reciting 'a chance blown, never known', I walk up the Lodge Offices' narrow flight of stairs, introduce myself and state my interest. Pause. She replies, 'Yes we do, just a minute, let me get them for you,' as she disappears into the vault.

Opening the book, I see each plot is transcribed with more detail than had the funeral records or the cemetery records combined. I scan each family plot of interest. Scanning down the Ward brothers plot ... there she was – Sarah Jane Ward Gilman ['Buried'] – in the same grave as her brother Albert Melville.

Many of the records housed at the Family History Library can now be viewed in digital format on home computers. Some records, however, can only be viewed at family history centers or affiliate libraries. These digital records include images and name indexes. Currently, there are about 400 million original records available in a digital format at affiliate libraries.
