RESEARCH RESOURCES: New England History and Genealogical Society (NEHGS)

NEHGS, specializing on research of American ancestors, is an invaluable resource for genealogists. The current quarterly publication of the Society, <u>American Ancestors</u> is available near the computers at the Napa Valley Genealogy Society library. Some highlights of the Fall 2021 edition:

- The organization has just published the sixth edition of *The Genealogist's Handbook for New England Research*.
- NEHGS also supports the Wyner Family Jewish Heritage Center which offers resources on Jewish genealogy.
- American Ancestors has a large collection of databases available on the website: <u>american</u> ancestors.org.
- An interesting article of family stories entitled "Ancestor Strong: Stories of Resolve.
- Articles about the Mayflower and the pilgrims in Massachusetts.

FOR ALL MAYFLOWER DESCENDANTS

The captain's journal from the 1620 trip of the Mayflower settlers is now available in a digital format at catalog.hathitrust.org (search for Record 011536370). This service is available on the computers at the Napa Valley Genealogical Society library.

1950 Census

Steve Morse did a wonderful job of explaining what to look for and how to use the information on the 1950 census, when he gave a talk at the Marine County Genealogy Society last month. BTW, I have appointed myself as the society lead on the FamilySearch indexing project for it and would love to hear from others who are willing to work on it. it's a lot of fun and is completely self paced and you do it at home on your own computer. It will be a little different than it was for the 1940 census ten years ago because they now have OCR capable of reading handwriting so we will start with a machine index and the volunteers will work at verifying and correcting it. Fingers crossed that this will result in a faster and easier job!

RESEARCHING CENSUS RECORDS


Back in the Folder The National Genealogy Society publishes a quarterly magazine with articles about genealogy and genealogy research. The fourth issue of this publication for 2021 focuses on census records.

In **April of 2022, the 1950 census** will become public. This issue includes an article with information on taking the census (the largest ever taken), the types of questions asked, searching the census by location, and a comparison of other years.

Other articles include: The Evolution of US Census Instructions: 1790-1870, Locating Hard-to-Find Census Entries, Using Social Statistics Schedules to Learn About Ancestral Communities, and Mortality Schedules: Death Records Before State Registration.

Additional articles cover finding free online newspapers and a detailed article about holding successful virtual meetings.

NGS is a valuable resource for genealogy researchers. Issues for 2021 and 2022 are available at the NVGS library. (They are back in the folder)





Volunteer Spotlight: Christine Dunn

For many years Chris commuted from Vallejo to San Mateo where she worked for the San Mateo Transportation District. She has family in both Vallejo and Napa and absorbed many stories about her families; she also spent time in Napa visiting relatives. Upon retirement in 2015 Chris wanted to make new connections to both communities. She joined the genealogy society in Vallejo and the Napa Valley Genealogical Society. She has served as a volunteer and secretary at NVGS.

In 1975 her husband became employed at Mare Island Shipyard as a diver (his dream job), so they moved to Vallejo. Later they bought a home that had been divided and converted to a duplex. Her husband restored the home to its original configuration and they lived there for 40 years where they raised three daughters.

During the last 5 years of her employment with San Mateo Transportation she served as the Public Information Officer. Chris dealt with timetables, schedules, public information flyers and other duties maintaining the public face of the Transportation District. She has brought those numerous skills to her position as secretary of the Society.

Her genealogy research began with the family stories and has expanded from there. The history has proved to be as interesting as the names and dates. She is related to Napa County Pioneers in the Chapman family. [There is a file of information on this family at the Genealogy Library.]

Along with her genealogy, Christine enjoys knitting and sewing.
