

Getting Started in Genealogy

- 1. Start with yourself and work backwards, not skipping generations along the way.
 - a. Accuracy is derived by working the entire family (siblings), not the extent of the depth of your search.
- 2. Survey family members for family bibles, baby books, photos, family stories.
- 3. If not familiar with computers or the Internet, learn these skills first.
- 4. Organize your data in a method that best suits you.
 - a. A software package will hold your documentation, including pictures, and not require duplicating data input. They can generate reports and graphs.
- 5. Use free resources, such as Family Group Sheets and Pedigree Charts to record your data, all downloadable from the Internet.
 - a. Women are recorded with their maiden name
 - b. Dates are recorded: ddmmmyyyy
 - c. Use acceptable abbreviations, e.g., abt, beg, aft, prob
 - d. Create a document of spelling surname variations (including initials for first name)
 - e. When searching, most of the time you will need to have a name, an approximate date, and an approximate location
 - f. Locations are recorded from smallest to largest, e.g., city, county, state, country (if outside U.S.)

- 6. Cite your sources as you enter your data. There will be conflicting information, which you must learn to reconcile.
 - a. Someone else's tree is not a source!
- 7. Collaborate! Ask for help!
 - a. Find a mentor
